Monetary Integration and Financial Structure. Implications for Regional Loan Markets

Abstract: Reviewing regional financial literature is helpful when analysing the possible influence of the finance industry on the process of convergence among euro zone countries. In this paper the authors survey such literature from the standpoint of market structure, with an emphasis on three different structures that may be felt to characterise the European financial market: perfect capital markets, institutional segmentation and market segmentation. While most studies on financial integration in Europe have concentrated on the first of those structures, perfectly competitive markets, there is good reason to believe that even despite the existence of full monetary integration, the structure of the European financial system is very likely characterised by the persistence of some type of either institutional or market segmentation. The present paper explores a number of different theoretical currents dealing with the study of regional financial markets, in particular neo- and post-Keynesian theories on rationing regional loan markets.

Lessons of the Multilateral Agreement on Investment: Restoring the Momentum Towards a Multilateral Investment Discipline

Abstract: This article describes the status of the attempts to negotiate multilateral arrangements for treating foreign investment, focusing on the experience gained during the negotiations taking place around the Multilateral Investment Agreement (MIA) in the framework of the OECD between 1995 and 1998. The MIA package was to have included a revised version of the OECD's Guidelines for Multinational Companies, currently being revisited within the organisation, for approval of the revised Guidelines by the OECD's Ministerial Meeting in 2000. The WTO working group on the relationship between trade and investment met ten times between 1997 and 1999. The European Union has clearly supported the negotiation of an investment agreement within the WTO: nonetheless, a majority of WTO member countries continues to be unconvinced of the need for multilateral investment discipline.

Electronic Commerce and the Millennium Round

On the one hand, this article addresses the problems posed to governments by the substantial growth of e-commerce, in particular in terms of privacy and consumer protection. On the other, it describes the work done in this connection within the World Trade Organisation (WTO), beginning with the «Work programme on electronic commerce» established in September 1998, based essentially on clarifying the application of



each of the WTO agreements (ACGC, AGCS and TRIPS) to this kind of trading, as well as to prevent the possible erection of trade barriers.

Economic Analysis of Reference Prices as a Criterion for Government Funding for Drugs

Abstract: In Spain, public spending on drugs accounts for a higher proportion of total public health spending than in any other European Union country. This article reviews one of the formulas proposed to rationalise pharmaceutical benefits and contain the growth of this expense: namely, to encourage the use of generic drugs and apply reference prices as a system for public sector payments. In this regard, reference prices are defined, the aims discussed and the systems used in other countries analysed. Finally, the justification for such prices is reviewed from the standpoints of economic theory and the impact of their implementation on drug spending, consumption and prices, with particular reference to the Spanish health system.

Types of Productive Structures in Multinational Manufacturing Firms in Spain

Abstract: Companies choose foreign countries as targets for their investments for a host of reasons. Such heterogeneity, in turn, leads to different productive structures. This paper intends to define such diversity in terms of a proposal for the classification of multinational companies. As the aim of the proposed taxonomy is to cover the largest possible number of factors related to these companies, their structure is based on Dunning's eclectic paradigm. The survey focuses on 364 multinational corporations operating in Spain. Both the ANOVA statistical model for variance analysis and the Duncan procedure were used to corroborate the classification.

Trade Liberalisation and Sustainable Development

The Role of the OECD as Driver of New International Trade Issues

Abstract: The OECD, through its analytical studies, is preparing the multilateral trade negotiations to be held in Geneva. The purpose of the studies is to provide negotiators, be they OECD member countries or otherwise, with information on innovative negotiating processes required for discussion. All the issues addressed during the WTO's Seattle summit, regardless of the prospects of their inclusion on the agenda for a future round, have been analysed: tariffs, services, agriculture, environment, competition and so on. The present article reviews these issues from the perspective of prior papers that have empirically shown that trade liberalisation directly benefits the economy and can thereby contribute to advances in other areas such as protection of the environment or enforcement of labour regulations.

The Beverage Packaging Industry: Analysis of Spanish Regulations and Collaboration Agreements

Abstract: The aim of making economic growth compatible with environmental balance has given rise to the regulation of the packaging and packaging waste industry (Directive



94/62/EC and Spanish Act 11/1997). The legal changes introduced have modified the behaviour of the agents involved in the production and treatment of used containers, which has in turn led to the implementation of efficient solutions and the appearance of an alternative system: an integrated management system for beverage packaging and waste from such packaging. The financial and organisational rationale for managing such a system has fuelled the design and formalisation of collaboration agreements geared to fostering compliance with the aims laid down in the Act.
